Dear Friends,

As President of the European Aquatics Association, it gives me great pleasure to write this message on the occasion of the latest edition of the European Water Polo Championships.

Before 7 October, we were all looking forwards to travelling to Netanya, Israel to take part in this event but sadly, the current situation in Israel, made this impossible. As we had no choice but to postpone the hosting of the Netanya event to a later time, our member federations from the Netherlands and Croatia stepped up to propose that they would host the event, split between a women's event in Eindhoven and a men's event in two locations: Zagreb and Dubrovnik.

This decision, taken in the interests of the athletes above all, is a marvellous demonstration of the solidarity and positive mentality of our membership. There will be some logistical challenges, but European Aquatics will work closely with the local organising teams to make these events a success.

Looking ahead to Eindhoven, we are very excited that our top event for European nations for the women's event is taking place in the Netherlands, where the women's team is one of the best in the world, let alone Europe. The facility itself, the state-of-the- art Pieter van den Hoogenband Complex, is outstanding, and not only hosted the European Aquatics Championships in 2008 and short course in 2010, but hosted the European Water Polo Championships in 2012

Now the women's event will head back to this wonderful pool and we can all look forward to it showcasing what has become the fastest growing branch of water polo. The women's game is making new converts across our continent and European Aquatics is confident that Eindhoven will mark a new chapter in the sport's development.

We can already see the great efforts made by the Royal Dutch Swimming Federation to find ways to promote and market this event in creative ways so as to attract the maximum number of spectators to the venue, as well as following on digital platforms.

I would like to warmly thank all the sport bodies, political authorities and sponsor partners who have committed to making the championships a success and also to give a special thank you for the technical water polo specialists at European Aquatics who put together the event timetable and match schedule with great care, to take account of the fact that the competition has overlapping men's and women's matches, in 3 different locations.

I look forward to joining you in Eindhoven between 5 and 13 January 2024.

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Excitement right from the start

- Eindhoven, Zagreb and Dubrovnik to host European Water Polo Elite 2024
- Olympic berths in the focus New format and 32 teams for the first time

Eindhoven/Zagreb/Dubrovnik (European Aquatics) – HAPPY NEW (OLYMPIC) YEAR – and lots of Water Polo excitement right from the beginning of 2024! And it's definitely not an overstatement that as the 2024 European Water Polo Championships kick off on 4 January in Dubrovnik and Zagreb, while the women's event begins a day later, on 5 January in Eindhoven, the matches will feature the crème de la crème of water polo.

As Europe is still ruling the Water Polo World (at the Tokyo Olympics held in 2021 seven out of the top 10 sides represented the Old Continent / the 2023 World Championships in Fukuoka saw 8/10 in the men's tournament and 7/10 in the women's tournament while all medals went to Europe / Men: gold – Hungary, silver Greece, bronze Spain / Women: gold – Netherlands, silver Spain – bronze Italy) Water Polo fans can expect more than 100 top-quality and thrilling matches.

Anyway, the 2024 Championships will add a new chapter to the 98-year-old history of the event. 32 teams (16 male and – for the very first time - 16 female teams) from 20 national federations will battle for title and the medals, but - what might even be more important - for one more Olympic ticket both in the men's and women's tournament, as well as for the last three remaining berths for the World Championships, taking place in Doha, Qatar in less than five weeks (February 2-18, 2024). Both Champions secure an Olympic berth. If any of the already qualified teams win gold, the next highestranked team would celebrate the qualification for Paris.

Additionally, the new two division format will celebrate its debut at this edition. From 2024 on, the field will be divided into a first and second division based on the ranks achieved at the previous edition in Split in September 2022. The new format will guarantee much more excitement from Day 1 as the top eight teams will play fierce contests in the group stage before the knockout phase begins. Better ranks in the group would secure extra rest days which will benefit the teams chasing the Olympic berth and World Championship spots. The winners and runners-up from Division 1's groups will advance directly to the quarterfinals, while the third and fourth-placed teams will meet the top two sides from Division 2's groups in a play-off round to decide who will also make the final eight. Also, Division Two sides will fight for the top ranks in groups C and D to have a shot at making the first division in the crossover matches.

Whereas Budapest in 2020 hosted the last edition before the outbreak of the Covid Pandemic, the Split edition in 2022 celebrated the comeback of water polo enthusiasts without restrictions at the Spaladium Arena. 2023 put a new challenge to European Aquatics. The Championships – originally scheduled to Netanya, Israel had to be re-allocated after the October 7 attacks and the outburst of the still-ongoing war. After it became obvious that the Championships could not take place in Israel, the difficulty was to find new hosts. At the end of November, European Aquatics announced Zagreb and Dubrovnik as host of the Men's tournament, whereas Eindhoven as the host of the Women's tournament. It will now be the first European Water Polo Championship since 1985 with venues in two different countries.





















The men's games will take place at the Mladost Sports Centre in Zagreb and the Gruz Swimming Hall in Dubrovnik – both indoor facilities and well-known from numerous international games. Zagreb had already hosted the European Water Polo Championships in 2010. The venue in Eindhoven is also wellknown – it's the Pieter van den Hoogenband Swimming Stadium, which already hosted the European Water Polo Championships in 2012.

MEN: Host Croatia wants to defend title on home soil – World Champions Hungary and Spain lead strong field of medal contenders

In the Men's tournament, the well-known powerhouses will have an eye on the top positions: Like in previous years Hungary, Croatia, Spain, Italy, Greece, Serbia and Montenegro must be considered as the top favourites also at this edition.

In Group A Croatia will meet Spain, Montenegro and France. The host will try to defend its 2022 title and hopes for "a good omen": on home soil (2010 Zagreb, 2022 Split) they always succeeded and snatched the trophy. Spain, who enjoyed a brilliant run since the home Europeans in Barcelona 2018 and took the world title in 2022, has often been among the top five but never won European gold. Montenegro's biggest triumph so far dates back to 2008, when the small country surprisingly won the European title right



upon their debut in Malaga. France arrives, just six months before the Olympic Games in their own country, with correspondingly high motivation. Already qualified for the Paris Games, "Les Bleus" want to make people sit up and take notice. For sure, they might well be considered as an ambitious team who could always be good for a surprise.

World Champion Hungary will meet Italy, Greece and outsider Georgia in Group B. Hungary has finished its transition period – after several veterans said goodbye and had to accept a 7th place at the Worlds on home soil in Budapest, they celebrated a successful comeback at the last events. In Split the record-holder for the most Olympic and European titles in history only finished European runner-up but took the crown at the 2023 Worlds in Fukuoka, beating the Greek in the final. Since this secured an Olympic berth for them, head coach Zsolt Varga decided to bring a young but ambitious team to Zagreb and offer some extra rest to seven star players who are facing a demanding run this year.

Sure, that Greece, who like Spain never won a European title, not even a medal so far, are not only looking for revenge but their first-ever European podium. Italy, World runner-up in 2022, missed the podium at the last edition in Split but celebrated a silver at the 2023 World Cup. Their third and foremost last European title dates back to 1995 in Vienna. Georgia will celebrate its sixth participation at Europeans, in 2022 they finished in the eight place.























In Group C Serbia will face Israel, Germany and Malta. The Olympic champion of Rio and Tokyo secured its Olympic spot early in the 2019 World League Super Final but missed the podium at the last big events. It will be interesting to see if the roller coaster ride of the formerly dominating Serbs who won four consecutive European titles in Eindhoven 2012, Budapest 2014, Belgrade 2016 and Barcelona 2018, ends at this edition. In Split 2022 Serbia finished only on 9th place behind Georgia. Half of Team Malta at this edition are newcomers, they should be the outsider of this group. Germany arrives with their new head coach, Milos Sekulic, succeeding Montenegrin Petar Porobic, who tragically died this autumn and the legendary Hagen Stamm, member of the Germans' last golden generation, clinching the title in Bonn 1989.

Group D will see the games between Netherlands, Romania, Slovakia and Slovenia. The Netherlands were also kings of Europe once, but it dates back to 1950 when they won in Vienna. Romania was the last surprise semi-finalists in 2006. Slovenia and Slovakia never made it into the top eight at Europeans.

Women: World Champion Netherlands want European crown on home soil - Title holder Spain looking for third title in a row

Who else but the Netherlands could be the ideal host to replace the originally host Netanya, Israel. Eindhoven has proved its skills already in 2012 as host of the 30th European Championships, when the January edition was introduced at which both tournaments were played in the same pool at the iconic Pieter van den Hoogenband Complex on alternating days.

Thanks to the evolution over four decades, women's water polo has become a constant feature at Olympic Games, and in Eindhoven a Paris 2024 berth is at stake as well, as the last two will be on offer at the Doha Worlds. For the first time ever, 16 teams will be participating.



For sure, Team Oranje, who already qualified for Paris, dreams of putting on the European crown on home soil. And the conditions couldn't actually be better, as they expect their guests in Group A as the reigning World Champions. For sure, Hungary with their new coaches Attila Mihok and Sandor Cseh, and Greece will make life difficult for the hosts, who won the European title in 2018 for the last time.

While the Netherlands, the all-time medal ranks leader, hope to make it half a dozen golds, recordholder Hungary might achieve its 15th medal at Europeans. The third giant, Greece, silver medallist four times in the last eight championships (2010, 2012, 2018, 2022) will guarantee a handful of thrilling matches in this group.























While in the men's tournament there were some trends in the last 10-12 years (winning streaks for the Serbs, Croatia's big run at the Worlds, Spain's consecutive finals recently), there was no sure bet in any women's tournament. While the US were for the most part unbeatable (at least in the knockout phase), the challengers were always changing, and at the Europeans, the trends were the same. The last seven editions saw five different champions, only Spain could win three times (2014, 2020, 2022).

With defending Champion Spain and Italy, two other powerhouses will meet in Group B. Since the women's water polo tournament was launched in the Norwegian capital Oslo in 1985, the Netherlands (1985-1987-1989) as well as Italy (1995-1997-1999) and Russia (2006-2008-2010) celebrated three consecutive titles. In 2024 Spain has a chance to catch up with these three teams. They already have three titles under their belt, but the fourth overall could also be the third in a row (2014, 2020, 2022) for the silver medallist of the Tokyo Olympics 2021.

Italy's Setterosa did a fine job too and crowned the rebuilding process under their new head coach, Carlo Silipo, winning bronze medals at the 2022 Europeans as well as at last year's Worlds in Fukuoka. Israel has become better and better from edition to edition. Like France, they are highly motivated and always good for a small surprise.

In **Group C** the teams of **Serbia** (9th place in Split 2022) and **Romania** (11th place in Split) meet with Czechia and Turkey. Both return – thanks to the new system with 16 instead of 12 participants in the women's tournament – after a longer absence. Czechia made their last appearance in 1997, finishing 11th. Turkey finished on 12th place in 2016 and 2018.

In Group D Slovakia, who replaced Russia at the last edition in Split and finished 12th, will meet Germany (10th 2022 Split) – and also after a longer absence – Great Britain. Team GB made their last appearance in Budapest 2014 (8th place). Their top result was a 6th place in 1985. Bulgaria is a newcomer, qualified for the first time ever.

...Eindhoven / Zagreb / Dubrovnik 2024 - FACTS & FIGURES...

... DATE: The 36th European Water Polo Championship – originally scheduled to Netanya, Israel – will take place in three different venues. From January 4 to 16, 2024 Zagreb and Dubrovnik will host the Men's tournament. Eindhoven will be host to the Women's tournament from January 5 to 13, 2024.

... EUROPEAN AQUATICS (EA / LEN): The "Ligue Européenne de Natation" - since 2023 European Aquatics - was founded on August 30, 1927 in Bologna/ITA by 11 countries and their national swimming federations, one year after the first European Championships in Swimming, Diving and Water Polo had been held in Budapest. Today LEN has 52 member federations from Albania to Ukraine.

... HISTORY: The European Water Polo Championships celebrated its première in 1926. The first event was held in Budapest, back than as part of the 'big championships', held together with the swimming and diving competitions. Until today, 35 editions in the men's event were carried out from 1926 until 2022. The first event in the women's competition took place in 1985. For the first time in 1999, a stand-alone continental showcase was staged in water polo. The championships take place every second year, over the summer in the middle of the Olympic cycle (as in 2022), or at the beginning of the year if it coincides with the Summer Olympics (since 2012). The last summer edition took place in Split/Croatia in September 2022, the last winter edition in Budapest/Hungary in January 2020. Budapest staged altogether five European Water Polo Championships (1926, 1958, 2001, 2014, 2020).

... HISTORY II: To date, five European titles in a row were only achieved by Hungary (1926, 1927, 1931, 1934, 1938). With five titles – as former Soviet Union – to their name, Russia is one of the most successful European water polo teams. However, they earned their last title in Strasbourg in 1987. While Yugoslavia, as a single country, could only win a single title till 1991, ever since its nations gained independence, they had a tremendous run "separately": between 2001 and 2018 only the former states of Yugoslavia won gold. Serbia topped the charts with five (2006, 2012, 2014, 2016, 2018), followed by Croatia (2010, 2022) and Montenegro (2008). Serbia and Montenegro also bagged gold in 2001 (then under the name Yugoslavia) and 2003.

... HISTORY III: 96 years ago, the first ever European Water Polo Championship matches were played in the ancient Csaszar Bath (next to the current site of the Komjadi Pool). Then the Margaret Island took over from 1954 where the legendary Alfred Hajos complex hosted numerous aquatic events in the past decades. It was in Vienna at the Ernst Happel Stadium in 1995 that European Championships were staged for the first time in a temporary pool (outdoors at that time). To have the championships in a multipurpose arena in a temporary pool, had first been created in Belgrade 2016. So far, 2016 Belgrade registered a world record attendance of 18.500 spectators at the Kombank Arena following the final between Serbia and Montenegro with Serbia to win their third successive European title.

... HISTORY IV: Ever since the stand-alone European Water Polo Championships were staged for the first time in 1999, three 'winter editions' (Eindhoven 2012, Belgrade 2016, Budapest 2020) were held indoors. Split 2022 was the first summer championships staged indoors (earlier, indoor pools were used many times in the framework of the multi-discipline championships, like in 1985, 1987 and 1993). Eindhoven/Zagreb/Dubrovnik will be the 4th winter edition.























...Eindhoven / Zagreb / Dubrovnik 2024 - FACTS & FIGURES...

- ... PARTICIPANTS: 16 male and for the first time ever 16 female teams will fight for the European title. With a total of 32 teams from 20 LEN Member Federations, the event in Eindhoven/Zagreb/Dubrovnik will be the largest European Water Polo Championships ever staged in Europe. In Belgrade, Barcelona and Budapest 2016, 2018 and 2020 teams from 17 Federation participated. The previous record participation of 16 male and nine female teams was set in Bonn/Germany in 1989. The new European champions will be crowned after 106 matches (48 men, 48 women).
- ... PREMIERES: In 2020 the women's team of Slovakia returned to the Championships after a 27-yearlong absence, when they participated in Leeds in 1993 for the first and the last time. In 2022 the only newcomer was the men's team of Israel, making the cut for the first time in history. In 2024 the women's teams of Bulgaria will celebrate their European premiere, while Great Britain and Czechia will celebrate their comebacks after a longer absence.
- ... TECHNIQUE: Since Budapest 2020, the VAR system is in use to determine goal-no goal situations and detect unsportsmanlike acts eventually remaining unnoticed. Also Eindhoven/Zagreb/Dubrovnik delegates and referees will be able to check all ambiguous situations on the screen right away on the pool deck.
- ... HOSTS I: The Croatian Water Polo Federation was founded in 1971. The WP Europeans return to Croatia for the fourth time: in 1981 the water polo competition was part of the 'big Europeans' held in Split, while Zagreb hosted the event in 2010 and Split, once again in 2022.
- ... HOSTS II: Besides Water Polo, the Royal Dutch Water Polo Federation (Koninklijke Nederlandse Zwem Bond, KNZB) overlooks several sports including Swimming, Open Water Swimming, Diving and Artistic Swimming. Eindhoven with its iconic Pieter-van-den-Hoogenband-Complex will be the host location of the European showcase for the 2nd time after 2012. Additionally, the Dutch city hosted the 2008 Aquatic Europeans as well as the 2010 Short-Course Swimming European Championships.
- ... COMPETITION MODUS: The new two-division format will celebrate its debut at this edition. From 2024 on, the field will be divided into a first and second division based on the ranks achieved at the previous edition in Split in September 2022. The new format will guarantee much more excitement from Day 1 as the top eight teams will play fierce contests in the group stage before the knockout phase begins. Better ranks in the group would secure extra rest days which will benefit the teams chasing the Olympic berth and World Championship spots. Also, Division Two sides will fight for the top ranks in groups C and D to have a shot at making the first division in the crossover matches.
- ... MEDALS: In the history of European Water Polo Championships from 1926 (Men) and 1985 (Women) until today – a total number of 162 medals in gold, silver and bronze (105 men / 57 women) have been awarded. 1962 in Leipzig/Germany, when Hungary took the title, two silver medals (and no bronze medal) were awarded to Yugoslavia and Russia.





















...Eindhoven / Zagreb / Dubrovnik 2024 - FACTS & FIGURES...

... **VENUEs**: The Europeans will take place at the following venues.

- The SP Mladost pool in Zagreb was built in 1987 (and opened for Universidee 1987), and is consisting of two Olympic-size pools, this venue has already been a host to the European Water Polo Championships back in 2010 as well as World League, World Cup, and numerous Champions League events. Before its renovation in 2005, the "Gruž" swimming pool had a capacity of even 5.000 seats! The capacity for the 2024 Europeans now is 2.000 seats. - Home waterpolo club: Mladost Zagreb. - Address: Jarunska ulica 5, 10000 Zagreb, Croatia.
- First built in 1961 and renovated in 2003, the Gruž pool in Dubrovnik is one of the most legendary water polo venues worldwide. It has been a host to mega events like several Champions League finals – eg the Final Four tournaments of the Champions League 2001 and 2006. With the capacity of around 2500, the atmosphere during the matches is unique and worth experiencing – both as a player and as a spectator. - Home waterpolo club: Jug Adriatic osiguranje Dubrovnik. - Address: Dr. Ante Starčevića 22, 20000 Dubrovnik, Croatia.
- The Pieter van den Hoogenband Swimming Stadium, named after the Dutch three-time Olympic Champion Pieter van den Hoogenband, is well practiced when it comes to hosting international major events. In the last decade, multiple international Championships took place in this venue. The venue was opened in 2006 and is one of the world's most innovative swimming centres for competition swimming as well as recreational activity. The venue is the home of Team NL elite swimming and diving. The competition pool is a 50m, 10 lane pool. The training pool is a 50m, 4 lane pool and will be used as warm up / swim down pool for the event. Additionally, there is a 25x20m diving pool available for training purposes. The venue has a total capacity of 3,000 spectator seats. The venue is currently undergoing a refurbishment resulting in the most up to date and state-of-the-art facility in 2025. The refurbishment does not have any implications for this Championship. - Address: Antoon Coolenlaan, 15644 RX Eindhoven, The Netherlands

... PRIZE MONEY: The prize money for both the men's and women's competitions breaks down as follows: 40.000 Euro for the 1st place, 30.000 Euro for 2nd place and 20.000 Euro for 3rd place.
